The Ghanaian community is relatively extensive within the Huntingdonshire District Council and integrate very well with other members of the community. A substantial number forms part of the CGA membership. There are at present 40 families in the Cambridgeshire Ghanaian Association (CGA). The project will be focussing on our main group and extend to non-members who are not part of the CGA group. CGA members have played part in other community projects in the Huntingdonshire community including Unity in the community which is held annually and organised by the Huntingdon Community Group(HCG); fashion shows and donating to other charities as previously mentioned in the application.
